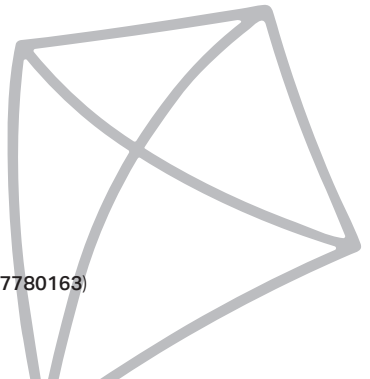
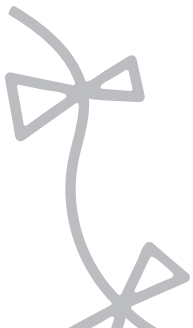

OUR EMERGENCIES:

REFUGEE CAMP SUPPORT PROJECT

Turkey hosts over half of the 6 million displaced Syrians. Since 2013, SSCh has been operating in a spontaneous camp along the Turkish - Syrian border, assisting over 900 families and 6,000 people, including 4,000 minors and hundreds of orphans. Active projects include food supplies, medical care, education, and emergency management to ensure dignified conditions for refugees, with special attention to children. SSCh's mission begins here.



POST-EARTHQUAKE PROJECT IN SYRIA

Since the earthquake in Syria on February 6, 2023, we support 150 families in three camps that bear our name. We regularly provide water tanks and continue to distribute food, blankets, and other necessities. Last autumn, we opened an office (a Help Point) that serves as a support center and listening point for the local community. We provide milk to 640 children, a number that continues to grow, many with serious conditions, and assist over 100 orphans in need of care. Our commitment in Syria is constantly evolving and never stops. Neither do we.



AL-RESALA PEDIATRIC CLINIC

The clinic we now operate in Syria is located in the Al-Resala camp and consists of several rooms. Our team is made up of two doctors and a nurse. The care provided is completely free. If for any reason the clinic is not accessible, the doctors reach those in need with a mobile medical vehicle equipped to move between various camps in the Azaz area.



AMAN PROJECT

Aman, a place where Syrian women can finally feel safe. In Syria, women are increasingly isolated due to the crisis. Their mobility has been progressively limited for fear of sexual violence, harassment, and indiscriminate attacks. With this project, we offer them a space to rebuild a social network, receive support, and gain training. Aman caters to 280 women, 360 girls, and 90 children. The total direct beneficiaries are 730; the families, considered indirect beneficiaries, number approximately 1,400.



MADAPROJECT, ONE DROP AT A TIME

In Madagascar, 75% of the population lives on less than 2 dollars a day. There is a lack of infrastructure. Political instability and a weak health system exacerbate the situation. The current drought has caused a severe food crisis, affecting millions of people, including a million children suffering from acute malnutrition. Since October 2023, we have been prioritizing drinking water. In the near future, we aim to build water infrastructure and promote sustainable agricultural practices.



GAZA, HELP NOW

In response to the emergency in Rafah, GAZA, we are committed to providing vital aid. With our team on the ground, we deliver 5,000 food parcels weekly despite communication difficulties and risks. Focusing on children, we prepare nutritious meals and strive to distribute fresh vegetables. To address the water shortage, we are planning the installation of water tanks to ensure autonomous supply. As long as the conflict and emergency can be declared over, we will be there.
